To report sewage across Houston to the Mayor and Public Works, please visit: https://houston311.powerappsportals.us/en-US/ or call 311 and specify the category as <u>sewer wastewater</u>. Reporting to 311 is important. Even when the city does not resolve the issue properly, your report creates a record that allows us to hold the city accountable and work to address categories of under-investment over the long-term.

CONTACT PUBLIC REPRESENTATIVES TO RAISE CONCERNS
