I'm writing to voice my support for protecting Conglomerate Mesa from industrial-scale gold mining exploration, which in turn will safeguard Inyo County's outdoor recreation economy. An open pit cyanide heap leach gold mine will hurt our jobs, bottom line, county tax revenue, and the quality of outdoor experience our residents and visitors have come to love.

Outdoor recreation is the economic engine of the Eastern Sierra, where local businesses like mine are highly dependent on tourism-based revenue. Residents and visitors of our county who enjoy recreating on our public lands will experience negative impacts from an open pit cyanide gold mine. Backpackers, hikers, solitude-seekers, hunters, mountain bikers, climbers and viewers of the desert night sky will suffer the ill-effects of this 24/7 mining and exploratory drilling operation.
