# TIMELINE: Recent gerrymandering cases

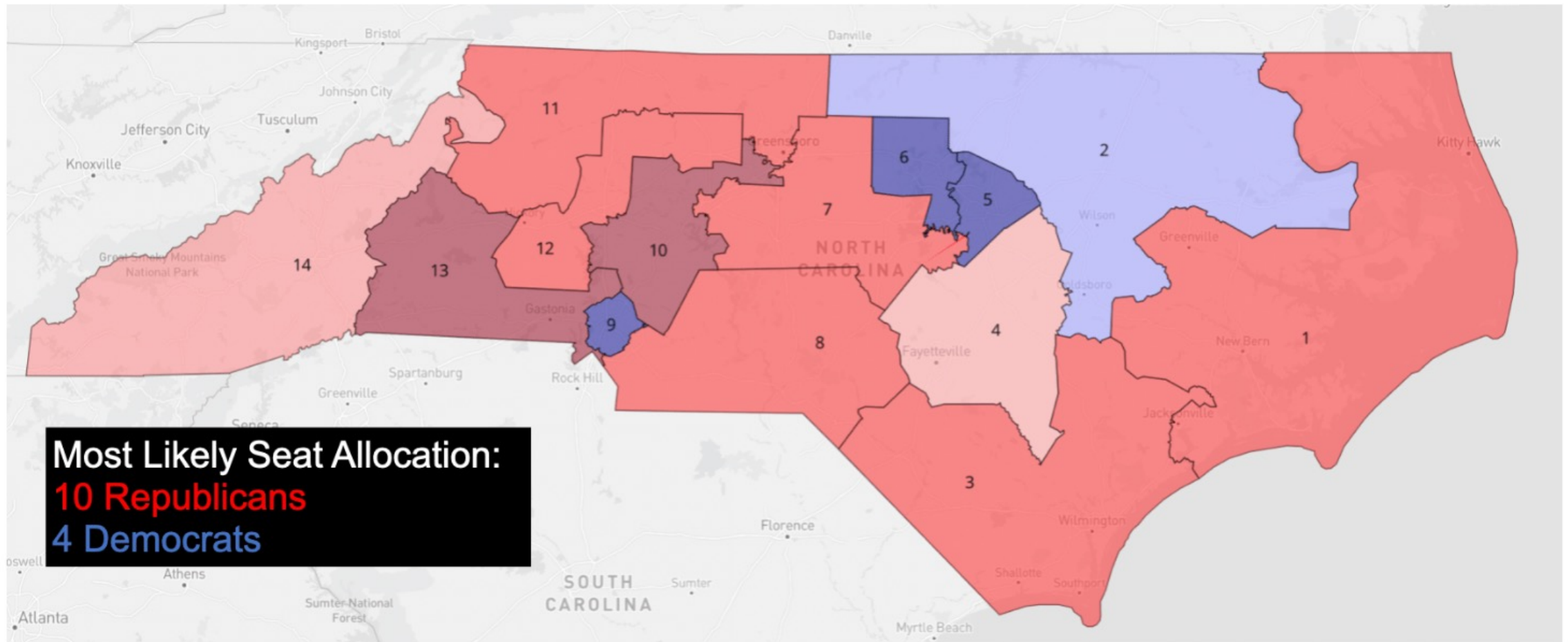
June 2019	<b><i>Rucho v. Common Cause</i></b> US Supreme Court	In 5-4 ruling, U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Roberts says federal courts are not able to address partisan gerrymandering, <b>but that state courts can.</b>
Sept. 2019	<b><i>Common Cause v. Lewis</i></b> NC Superior Court	NC Superior Court rules partisan gerrymandering violates the NC Constitution and <b>orders new legislative maps drawn for the 2020 election.</b>
Oct. 2019	<b><i>Harper v. Lewis</i></b> NC Superior Court	This NC Superior Court case results in new <b>congressional maps</b> for the 2020 election.
2021	NC legislature draws new, extremely gerrymandered congressional and legislative maps as part of the decennial redistricting process after the 2020 Census.	
Feb. 2022	<b><i>Harper v. Hall</i></b> NC Supreme Court	NC Supreme Court <b>strikes down</b> the legislature's gerrymandered congressional and legislative maps, orders new maps drawn for 2022 election.
Dec. 2022 - Jan. 2023	<b><i>Moore v. Harper</i></b> US Supreme Court	U.S. Supreme Court will hear legislative defendants' appeal of North Carolina gerrymandering case Harper v. Hall.

# NCGA's Original Congressional Plan (Struck Down)

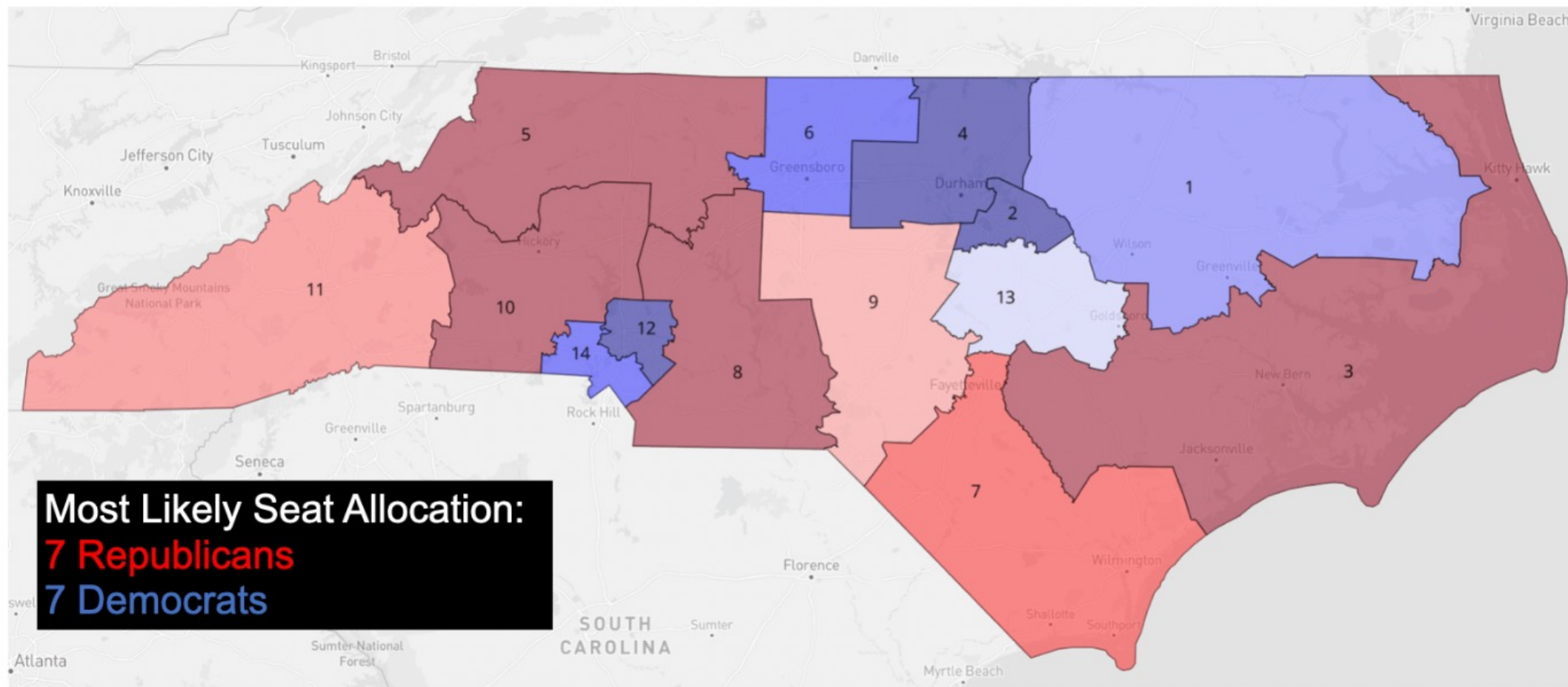

# NC Supreme Court Ruling: Harper v. Hall

- “unconstitutional beyond a reasonable doubt”
- “The General Assembly violates the North Carolina constitution when it deprives a voter of his or her right to substantially equal voting power on the basis of party affiliation.”
- “The trial court specifically found that the General Assembly diminished and diluted the voting power of voters affiliated with one party on the basis of party affiliation.”

# *Moore v. Harper*

**On June 30, 2022, the U.S. Supreme Court decided to take up *Moore v Harper***

- Will be argued December 7, 2022
- Decision expected in Summer 2023

# *Moore v. Harper*

In *Moore*, North Carolina lawmakers are essentially arguing:

> State legislatures should have near **absolute power** to run federal elections with **no checks and balances** from our state courts.

# *Moore v. Harper*

- Based on “**independent state legislature theory**”
- Could reverse our partisan gerrymander case
- Could negate state constitutional voting rights in federal elections
